



Emergency Manager's Weekly Report U.S. Capitol Attack Situation Report #4 (January 12th)

Highlights:

Attack Investigation

- The Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) has opened more than 160 case files and the U.S. Department of Justice (DOJ) has charged 70 people.
- The FBI has received 100,000 tips and still requesting the public's help on this investigation. Individuals can submit tips by calling 1-800-CALL-FBI (1-800-225-5324) or reporting tips online at: <http://fbi.gov/USCapitol>
- The scope and scale of the investigation into this attack is unprecedented. The cases being investigated includes:
 - Trespassing
 - Theft of mail
 - Theft of national security and national defense information
 - Felony murder
 - Civil rights excess force
 - Sedition
 - Conspiracy
 - Assault and battery on law enforcement officers
 - Assault on members of the media
- The FBI is seeking the public assistance in identifying certain individuals. Details are available [here](#).
- Information is still being requested on the person(s) responsible for the placement of suspected pipe bombs in the District of Columbia. More pictures have been made available, details are provided [here](#).
- The U.S. Capitol Police Department (USCP) is reviewing video and other open source materials of some USCP officers and officials that appear to be in violation of Department regulations and policies:
 - The USCP Office of Professional Responsibility will investigate these behaviors for disciplinary action, up to, and including, termination.
 - Several USCP officers have already been suspended pending the outcome of their investigations.
- Federal law enforcement agencies and the District of Columbia Metropolitan Police Department honored fallen USCP Officer Brian Sicknick during his funeral procession through Washington, DC.



Inauguration Planning

- The USCP announced that there will be no public access to the Capitol Grounds during the 59th Presidential Inauguration, and the event will go on as scheduled.
- In preparation for the Inauguration, the following road closures are in effect beginning today, January 12, until further notice:
 - Independence Avenue between Washington Avenue, SW, and Second Street, SE
 - Constitution Avenue between First Street, NW, and Second Street, NE
 - East Capitol Street between First and Second Streets
- The District of Columbia Mayor has made the following requests of the Federal government:
 - The extension of the National Special Security Event from January 11 to January 24.
 - The creation of a Security and Federal Force Deployment Plan to ensure the protection of Federal facilities.
 - That the FBI provide daily intelligence threat briefings to the local, State and Federal partners involved in Inauguration planning.
 - That the U.S. Department of the Interior cancel and deny any public gathering permits from January 11-24.
- The District of Columbia's request for a Federal Emergency Declaration for the Inauguration has been approved by the President:
 - Incident period: January 11-24
 - Provides Category B (Protective Measures) reimbursement for direct Federal assistance at 100% Federal funding.
